<u>Hillcrest PLUS trip to Bowling Green, Horse Cave, and Louisville, KY-May 14-16, 2009</u>

This list contains possible attractions that we could visit. Out itinerary will depend on what is available when I make reservations and how time constraints come into play.

Kentucky Down Under and Kentucky Caverns

3700 L&N Turnpike Rd. Horse Cave 42749

This attraction consists of a unique journey through the wonders of Australia. The class will be able to encounter the culture and wildlife of animals that inhabit the continent that they have never seen before. The Outback Walkabout includes a stroll through a field where kangaroos, wallabies, emus, and other animals roam freely. The walk in aviary has lorikeets that mimic several sounds. They will also eat nectar from one's hand. There is also an opportunity to see a presentation that introduces the culture, tools and musical instruments of the Australian Aborigines at Camp Corrobee. We can also visit Taraba Station which is home to donkeys, miniature horses, goats, rabbits, and more. In the park there is also an active cave system in which we can be guided. This experience would teach the students about a culture and life with which they are unfamiliar.

Before our trip, we will do a mini lesson on Australia so all of the children have some back ground. After the trip, I will do a follow-up discussion.

Louisville Slugger Museum and Factory

The Slugger Museum is a place to learn about the history of hitting with legendary memorabilia. The class can take part in interactive exhibits such as staring down a 90mph fastball in a batting cage. We would be able to tour the factory where Louisville Slugger bats are made for the pros of today, discover a prehistoric glove, and see the world's biggest bat. This museum would educate the students about the all-American past-time of baseball, how baseball bats are made, and the legacy of many remarkable baseball players from the past, present, and will hopefully inspire them for the future.

Before our visit to the museum and factory, I will have the children discover the history of baseball and why each student thinks it is so important to our culture. After the trip, I will ask if they still feel the same about their opinions.

Louisville Zoo

With more than 1,300 exotic animals, the Louisville Zoo has a wide variety of exhibits including an award-winning Gorilla Forest, a HerpAquarium with rare white alligator, pygmy hippos, lorikeets to eat out of one's hand, wallroos and botanical gardens. We could also visit Glacier Run Splash Park. This is a small water park inside the zoo. Classes and workshops are also available upon request that provide hands-on opportunities.

We will spend the night in the zoo if there is an opening reservation. During this all night excursion, we will be able to sleep under the stars or inside. We will have guided tours during the dark and in the morning. Presentations will be given featuring the animals, group activities will be conducted relating to the topic of the night, and there will be a nature video. The zoo offers extensive pre-visit and post-visit materials that will be sent three weeks before the visit for their classes. They also send a teacher packet that has materials that will help me prepare the children for the visit.

Frazier International History Museum

This state-of-the-art museum has a world-class collection that contains Britain's Royal Armouries (which includes the Tower of London) and the Frazier Collection. The museum contains artifacts that span 1,000 years. In addition, we will have the opportunity to see costumed performers portray interesting characters throughout history. Included in these performances, we will have the chance to see the interpretation of the life of John Wilkes Booth. This 3-person interpretation examines what Booth was like as a child and a young man, his dedication to Southern principles, and his belief that Abraham Lincoln would destroy the Union and make himself a king.

Before going on the field trip, we will discuss John Wilkes Booth and his assassination of Abraham Lincoln. I will ask the students why they believe he murdered Lincoln. Upon return, I will see if the children feel the same way.

Lost River Cave

2818 Nashville Road Bowling Green, KY 42101

At this natural wonder, we will be able to take a boat ride to see where people say Jesse James' gang used the cave as a hideout, where Native Americans sheltered themselves within the massive natural opening for thousands of years, and where Confederate forces used the cave as a temporary shelter in 1861 only to be followed by Union troops using the shelter one year later. We will board a boat and enter the cave of the mouth. We will be taken on the only Underground Boat Tour in Kentucky. We will be able to view wildflowers, trees, birds, a Butterfly garden, and unique Blue Holes.

Before our trip, we will talk about the importance of caves, and why we should make our visit to the Lost River Cave. We will touch on the fore mentioned groups/people that used the cave for shelter so the children are familiar with them and why they used it. The website for the Lost River Cave also offers units of study on caves, rocks, people in caves, and animals that might make their habitat in or near a cave. After the field trip we will discuss the visit further.

Kentucky Derby Museum

704 Central Ave. Louisville 40208

Located at Gate 1 of the historic Churchill Downs, the museum presents the traditions and importance of the Kentucky Derby. It exemplifies and teaches the economics, history, and significance of the Kentucky Derby. In the museum, students can learn about the excitement and thrill that comes from the "greatest two minutes in sports." Included are two floors of interactive, horse racing-related exhibits, and 360- degree high-definition video presentation, and a walking tour of Churchill downs. There will not be a race at the time of visit or any gambling in the presence of the children.

Before our field trip, we will discuss the importance of the derby, the training the horses must go through, and why the students think jockeys choose this particular sport. Upon return, we will have another discussion about how they felt visiting the Downs and the museum.

We would stay in a hotel one night.
