2011-2012 Extended Learning Programs Activity Description

Activity Number: 1 Activity Title: Remediation, Intervention, and Tutorial

Priority Need # 1 and 2

Related Goal: 1, 2, and 3

Objective(s): 1, 2, 3, and 4

Target Population:

Efforts for this activity will concentrate on (but not be limited to) 1st - 12th grade students who are falling behind academically and who need remediation, tutorial, and intervention assistance based on previous TCAP scores, reports cards, previous test performance (including end-of-course and ACT for grades 9-12 and TCAP scores for grades 3-8). Efforts will also be made in this activity to fulfill academic needs of students not being met during the regular school day including Credit Recovery programs for core courses and Saturday School remediation. Activities will be directed toward improving student skills in study habits, reading, math, science, and social studies. An effort will be made to incorporate the use of technology and music into the remediation, intervention, and tutorial activities. Students in grades 6-12 who are at risk of failing will be remediated during the summer in the areas of math, English, science, and social studies.

Activity Description:

Activities will be designed to provide instruction for K-12 students in the following categories: study habits, low performing academic areas (specifically including 3rd grade reading and 7th grade math), and homework activities. Students qualify for remediation, intervention, Credit Recovery, and tutorial services by being behind academically and by being recommended by their classroom teacher, guidance counselor, title teacher, special education teacher, Reading Recovery teacher, or school principal. These students will be tutored on a scheduled basis and their progress will be reported to the person(s) who recommended them to the program. Technology, including Accelerated Math® and Think Link are an integral part of this activity. The majority of this program will be operated during the school year. Full contracts (per teacher extended contract) will be reserved to provide remediation activities during the summer in the areas of math, English, science, and social studies for students in grades 6-8, and Credit Recovery for students in grades 9-12 who are at risk of failing core subjects.

Resources Needed (must match spending plan and ARRA requirements for calculating jobs retained):

- 2, 9-12 English teachers at 8 weeks
- 2, 9-12 math teachers at 8 weeks
- 2, 9-12 science teachers at 8 weeks
- 2, 9-12 social studies teachers at 8 weeks
- 12, 6-8 English teachers at 8 weeks
- 12, 6-8 math teachers at 8 weeks
- 12, 6-8 science teachers at 8 weeks
- 12, 6-8 social studies teachers at 8 weeks
- 20, K-5 teachers at 8 weeks
- 1, Pre-K teacher
- 4, Central Office Supervisors of Instruction at 8 weeks

Performance Measure(s):

This activity will be measured through increased success rate by students as determined through documentation of entrance level scores verses exit level scores, and also by a resulting increase in the system promotion rate, the system's TCAP Scores (reading, math, social studies, and science), end-of-course test scores, ACT scores, and percentage passing Gateway examinations the first time.

Evaluation Results from Previous Year (if applicable):

Tutoring activities for the 2010-2011 school year involved students at all grade levels and had good participation levels. Results of tutoring activities are listed below:

System Summer Remediation 6-12

There were 57 students enrolled in the summer remediation program. 57 of the students completed the program and 0 dropped out prior to course completion. All of the 57 students received credits in courses they were failing prior to the program. 37 students completed summer coursework via credit recovery. Retention rates were decreased system-wide as a result of the Summer Remediation Program and Credit Recovery. It is important to note that 4 seniors may not have earned a high school diploma if they had not participated in this program.
